## **National Week of Deaf People**











23rd - 29th September 2024

This year International Week of Deaf People is celebrated 23 – 29 September 2024.

The International Week of Deaf People is a week-long international celebration of Deaf individuals and the Deaf community across the world. This includes celebrating the International Day of Sign Languages (IDSL).

These two events are traditionally held during September and are based on the founding date of the WFD (23 September 1951). International Week of Deaf People is an opportunity for Deaf people to celebrate their communities, language, culture and history; make the public aware of their local, state and national Deaf communities; and to recognise their achievements.

The theme this year is Sign up for Sign Language Rights - This is your sign to learn and practice New Zealand Sign Language! We're want to create a world where Deaf people can sign anywhere. The best way to achieve this is to increase access to NZSL in all aspects of life! Read on to find out some ways you and your whanau can learn and practice NZSL.


